ABSTRACT

This research analyzes the portrayal of Jeffrey Dahmer's psychopathy as represented in the Netflix series Dahmer – Monster: The Jeffrey Dahmer Story. The study applies a qualitative descriptive method using Robert D. Hare's theory of psychopathy to identify both symptoms and causes of Dahmer's psychological condition. The findings reveal that Dahmer demonstrates emotional and interpersonal traits such as glibness, superficial charm, egocentrism, deceitfulness, manipulation, shallow emotions, lack of empathy, and lack of remorse. Additionally, lifestyle symptoms including impulsivity, poor behavioral control, irresponsibility, and a constant need for excitement further reinforce his psychopathic profile. The causes of these traits are largely associated with nurture factors, particularly Dahmer's unstable family environment, emotional neglect, parental conflict, rejection, and social alienation during his formative years. The series illustrates how these environmental influences, combined with Dahmer's personality traits, contribute to his antisocial and destructive behavior. This study contributes to the psychology of literature by providing insights into how psychopathy is depicted in film and television, thereby enriching discussions of character development, narrative representation, and media portrayals of mental illness and crime.

In regard to this, Hare asserts that at the core of psychopathy is a profound lack of empathy and the capacity for genuine emotional connection, as psychopaths are often characterized as predatory individuals who manipulate and exploit others solely for the purpose of satisfying their own egocentric needs and desires (Hare).

This disturbing psychological profile has been the subject of extensive research and clinical observation, with psychologists and psychiatrists seeking to better understand the underlying mechanisms and causes of this condition. One key aspect of psychopathy is the

ability of individuals with this condition to appear outwardly normal and blend seamlessly into society, making them difficult to identify (Hintjens 2). Cleckley in Buzina (2012) denotes that psychopaths may not necessarily engage in criminal acts, but they often exhibit a concerning array of socially and morally problematic behaviors, including a pronounced lack of remorse, shallow emotional responses, and an impersonal, detached approach to personal relationships, this ability to present a veneer of normalcy while concealing a disturbing psychological reality has long fascinated researchers and the general public alike (Buzina).

The way how psychopathy itself represented may various, as for this phenomenon represented through such literary products as a Netflix TV series entitled *Dahmer – Monster*: The Jeffrey Dahmer Story Series. The series focuses on the life of Jeffrey Dahmer, and how he became one of the most notorious serial killers in America. The series is taken from the real story of a white man called Dahmer, that happened between 1987 and 1991. The serial killer case was finally revealed in Milwaukee in 1991 with the total of 17 victims. The series provides a powerful example of psychopathy in action, offering viewers a direct and thoughtprovoking portrayal of a dangerous individual who was able to conceal his true nature from those around him. By highlighting this case study, the series aims to raise awareness and foster a sense of vigilance among people of all ages, as Verstappen underlined that psychopathy can manifest in the closest of relationships and pose a significant threat (5).
